- Torval—bank manager
- not clean or decent cases, Torval is too clean and decent, does not want to touch criminal or liar. Can't stand being around criminals and liars.

Nora:

- Torvald see a child when he looks at Nora
 - innocent
 - pet
 - airhead
 - clean
 - beautiful
 - can dance
 - really sweet
 - can sing
- Nora really
 - lies
 - pretends
 - sneaky
 - manipulative
 - “acting”—actress

Nora (added 3/18/13)	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● loves to please Torvald 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● lies, pretends, takes loan, forgery (breaks the law) <p>hereditary—you are who you are because of your parents.</p> <p>*“tear them to bits”</p>

		<p>Nora—act/costume, Torvald picks out. (symbolic costume)</p> <p>Torvald only sees</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • beauty, innocence • Doll pretend to be whatever Torvald wants • happy, child-like, innocent
Krogstad (added 3/18/13)	for sons love	forgery/blackmail
Kristine Linde	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • to save her 2 brothers and mother—loves them 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • marries for money, does not love her husband. • lying

- Torvald wants Nora all to himself, always dressed in the “costume” of his choosing.
- Nora “dresses up” every day and people, including Torvald, don’t really know who she is.
- One of the only times she can take the “costume off” is with Dr. Rank and maybe Kristine.
- Nora’s lie is starting to unravel.

3/25/13 Ongoing Notes Dramatic Irony:
Audience knows more than the characters.

Situational Irony:
Events/situations are opposite of what is expected.

Forgery=crime—Nora found this out.

Nora	Forgery, lies, pretends, manipulates Torvald, borrows money, keep secrets, wears costume	Loves husband Torvald
Krogstad	Forgery, blackmails	Loves son
Kristine Linde	Marries for money (lying)	Loves brothers and mom

Torvald	Treats Nora like a child demeaning to Nora, total control, superior, wants Nora to self, keeps Nora in costume, "clean & decent," smart, tough,

Nora's costume—childlike, doll, "little girl," innocent, feminine, fragile, beautiful, submissive, naive

Torvald's costume—king, boss, power, take charge, superior, strong, supervise, dominant, independent, adult "dad", alpha male,

Why don't they just get rid of the costumes?

Tuesday, 3/26/13 Ongoing Notes:

Literal: actual, physically able, real, exact

Figurative: (figure of speech) not real but use to get a point across, creates an image

Types: idiom, metaphor, similes

Symbolism — special kind of figurative language, represents something, some big concept

Nora's costume is symbolic—represents female gender role

- **innocent**
- **childlike (naive)**
- **inferior**
- **weak/fragil**
- **beautiful**
- **maternal/nuturing**

costume party—play the role = act

Nora wants to get rid of the "costume" of her female gender role.
